A report from Loran Sell and Pastor Patricia - we attended a Zoom meeting 4/29/2020 with Marion County Commissioner C. Willis along with local church, synagogue and mosque leaders in Marion County. The topic was stated to be – reopening churches.

It became clear early in the conversation that Commissioner Willis and later Jody Christensen, Mid Valley Regional Solutions coordinator for the Oregon Governor's office were seeking our input regarding the relaxing of stay at home restrictions in the state of Oregon, their affect on churches and their activities, consideration as other venues, i.e., bars and restaurants.

Conversation began with Commissioner Willis speaking of Phase 1 restrictions with items for discussion being: 1. Size of gathering 2. Time spent in proximity 3. Singing as an additional issue for protection. The state is considering a 3 phase reopening with Phase 1 groups 10 or less, Phase 2 groups of 50 or less, and larger groups in Phase 3. Churches were originally in Phase 3 but are proposed to be moved to Phase 1. In addition to the 3 above, requirements for reopening may include but not be limited to: cleaning and sanitizing, tracking, time between services, social distancing and masks.


There was discussion about using fire capacity in our buildings as a criteria for determining allowable group sizes and allowing church group sizes of 50 in the early phases. There were also discussions on holding simultaneous meetings in adjoining spaces and cleaning guidelines between services.

Katrina Rothenberger, public health contact, was also on the call and explained that children were a big factor in our decisions going forward. Guidelines coming out for child care facilities will be helpful in making decisions about child participation in churches.

When the issue of Holy Communion was brought up Commissioner Willis specifically stated that he felt the government should make no guidelines about Holy Communion because it is solely a church matter. He did emphasize that distancing and food preparation guidelines were to be followed.

Pastor requested the governor review the policies of not allowing pastors into hospitals and care facilities as it effectively denies these people the pastoral care they need at critical times. She also suggested that funerals in a church building are easier to control social distancing than at a graveside service.

Ms. Christensen from the governor's office commented on testing kits, temperature checks upon entering buildings, and the uncertainty of the length of each phase. They are asking vulnerable populations (over 60 and immunocompromised) to remain in place at least through phase 1, thus limiting church services to healthy and younger populations. – Folks, we offer you this information so you can stay on top of the developments - blessings+

Sermon for May 3, 2020 The Fourth Sunday of Easter.

The light is in the people, and in the moments where we show each other we care. I've said these words to you before. Actually, in a sermon, my sermon for the 4th Sunday in Lent, and here we are in the 4th Sunday in Easter. The rhythm of life is something I notice a lot, and here it is the rhythm of worship – Lent has come and gone, as well as hoy week, and easter Sunday and now we are at the 4th Sunday of Easter and we're back to the gospel of John. March 22^{nd} I talked to you about John chapter 9 and now, we finally finish that story in John chapter 10. Our theme here at Holy cross for Lent was "Conversations Matter". Jesus does his best teaching, his best relating to be people, heart to heart in the conversations in the gospel of John. John 9, which we read on March 22, is all about the man born blind who Jesus miraculously heals, and then, its all about the bickering that the bossy people In authority do as they try to wittle down the miracle of the man who regained his sight. This reading from John 10 is what follows the bickering. Jesus sits the difficult people down and tells them a story.

I love the story he tells them, all about the Sheep who are loved and cared for by the shepherd. You've heard this story before, "The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice." You know in your heart, and from the stories you've heard, that Jesus is the good shepherd, benevolently caring for the sheep, with love and care. But he is also the fierce protector of the sheep. As Jesus tells those bossy and unpleasant listeners here in John 10, He is the gate. When the sheep are in the sheepfold, drowsy with sleep in the night, the sheepherd lays down in the opening of the sheepfold. He is the gate, The one that lets them in to rest, and the one who will fend off evildoers and those who would harm the sheep. He will protect them all night. It's his purpose, his calling. As Jesus tells this story to those bossy and unpleasant folks who refused to embrace and care for the man born blind who received his sight from Jesus, I don't think there's much doubt what Jesus is doing. He's warning the evildoers. I protect my own, with all the fierceness that is needed. Don't try to hurt the ones I love. I will defend them. But, even more than that, Jesus is being pastoral to these Pharisees. He knows they are flawed, weak people, worthy of his love as much as the man born blind was worthy.

I started this sermon today with these words – the light is in the people and in the moments where we show each other we care. Have you ever had a backyard dinner, where you had one of those candles in a jar to protect it from the wind? The wind still blows the flame around, so that it flickers and dances with gusto. For me, this time as I read these words in John 10, Jesus' protective nature comes out loud and clear for me – like a sturdy glass jar protecting a candle, God is surrounding us all, you and me, and all the peoples of the world. We have lived through one of the most frightening times in our world. Thousands of people have died. Thousands more have been taken seriously ill. Thousands are out of work, and so many have been locked down, quarantined, in their homes, or nursing homes. We have not been able to gather in worship in our church.

And so I am drawn to this conversation Jesus has with those who would hurt his people. Don't try it I hear him saying. I protect I defend. I keep people safe. And that includes you. Jesus and his light are all around us, and our own light is within a protected space. Jesus' purpose is to protect us. I believe that. The light is in the people and in the moments where we show each other we care. And, in this conversation Jesus has with the bossy people, people like us, he reminds us again, that protecting us, caring for us, and nurturing our light is Jesus' purpose on earth – to be the human gate protecting his flock from all danger. Amen.
