The Sermon for June 21, 2020 The narrative in Genesis for today is the story of Hagar and Ishmael cast out of the camp by Abraham, at Sarah's request. It's not a happy story. Abraham, the father of nations, has what the lord promised. A son to carry on his name, to create a great nation. Just as God promised to him. And In you, God tells him, all the nations of the world will be blessed.

But there's just one problem. When Sarah and Abraham were not able to conceive a son, they solved their problem by Abraham sleeping with Hagar, Sarah's handmaid. And they had a son, Ishmael. But that son isn't needed anymore. God saw to it that Sarah conceived in her old age, and gave birth to Isaac. Well, now everything is good – that great nation is coming, and all will be blest. Except Ishmael is in the way. At least Sarah things he is. He is a reminder of when they didn't trust God. But, he is a little boy. A person. Flesh, blood, dreams and hopes. And Abraham tries to sweep him off the stage of their lives. And God appears to assent to this – It's Isaac he says, where your nation will be built.

Hagar leaves the camp with enough water and food to be comfortable perhaps a day, and goes into the wilderness. She casts her son beneath a bush, and goes to sit a bows shot away so she can't hear his suffering. And cries out to God. God hears but also hears the boy crying under the bush. Arise, hold him fast, God says, for I will make of him a great nation. That seems to be a theme with God, making great nations. And they go off, Hagar and Ishmael, and they make a life, and a nation - history will record the descendents of Ishmael are the nation of Islam. People of the book, just as the children of Israel are people of the book. God is worshipped in both camps, and the people prosper. And the world is blessed through both nations. But, of course you know the story of the Middle east. Tribe against tribe, One nation against another nation, for hundreds of years. Bloody wars, conflict and strife. And families and children and plenty. Not so different from the continent I live on - north America, where faction stands against faction generation after generation. The players seem to change - and fight shifts - I can think of loyalists versus patriots in the revolutionary war, north versus south in the civil war. But always, it seems, we look for some group to marginalize - we're better than they are, that's for sure. I cannot imagine God is honored in these conflicts, in these selfish spats. This week, we commemorated the 5 year anniversary of the killing of 9 innocent men and women at Mother Emanuel Ame church in Charleston south Carolina. An act of hate, filled with racial slurs. The young man who killed those people was baptized and confirmed in a Lutheran church just like ours. That's the part that hurts me the most. I can remember the faces of each young person I have baptized, each one I have confirmed. I remember them all as eager, as engaged, and open to what the world had to offer. I find it hard to picture any of them capable of murder and hate. And yet, here it is. In front of us. How will we, as people who love God, and shun divisive behavior, find a way forward after having this legacy of hate in our midst? Fear not, we are told, God has heard the voice of the boy where he is, under the bush. God hears. And in the picture in my mind of Hagar and the boy walking away from total loss, hand in hand, toward what their God has to offer, I find some peace. God's hand is on those two. God's hand is on the murderer of the Emanuel 9. God's hand is on us. Can we learn from these horrific stories, and lean towards the grace of God offered freely? We are certainly forgiven my friends, for all that we confess to God, and probably more than that. Can we reach out to that forgiveness as our touchstone? This life is really not about being right, and others being wrong. This life is about forgiveness, about grace, and about challenge to life into these gifts with humility.

I am humbled by the love of God that reaches out to me when I am in need. May God give me, and all of you, the humility to see where you and I need to be forgiven, to change, to become people of God's promise – focused on the rights of others, and the kindness needed so that through each of us, all the nations of the world will be blessed. Amen – Pastor Patricia+
