

Sermon for August 16, 2020 And Joseph wept so loudly that the Egyptians heard it and the household of Pharoah heard it. I remember going to the doctor for a 'well baby checkup' about 8 weeks after having my first child, Christopher. A lot of you have met Christopher – 6 foot 5 forty something. And we weighed him, and measured him, and looked him over tip to toe. And then the doctor said to me, "Have you sat in the middle of the kitchen floor crying yet?" And of course, I had, I was about to turn 21, and there was no family anywhere around us, and I was so sure I was doing everything wrong. I remember most clearly the thought that crossed my mind, "What was God thinking trusting someone like me with the life of a baby?" It was terrifying. Lovely, and wonderful but terrifying. Have you wept? In these covid days? Have you wept for the loss of simple hugs to your neighbor or friends? Have you wept for the loss of the way things used to be? For singing the hymns in church? For not being able to share the peace by touching your neighbor? Have you wept for the loss of dreams? The dream of vacationing or visiting family? Have you wept for hundreds of thousands of people dead in 2020?

It seems to me we have entered the snotty phase of the pandemic. Maybe people are just on edge, but I have heard more snotty remarks in the last week or two than in the previous months. And I have snotty remarks ready to go on the tip of my tongue in response. I'm praying they stay on my tongue and that I don't speak them. The isolation, the constant change, and the poor example people in the public eye are setting about their own words and actions have created a perfect storm. Have you sat in the middle of the kitchen floor and wept yet?

We have jumped far in the Joseph story since last week. He was stolen and sold last week by jealous brothers, and in the intervening 8 chapters, has experienced highs and lows worthy of an epic novel. Imprisoned, enslaved, and then, interpreting dreams for his contemporaries propels him to the seat of power, where he solidifies his power through God's gift of vision, of future casting. And in that seat of power, during the worst famine imaginable, he controls the food in Egypt, so much that the brothers come from Canaan to beg for food from wealthy Egypt. And Joseph tortures them, uses them as pawns, even imprisoning Simeon until they bring back Benjamin, the youngest, and then when they return, planting an expensive cup in Benjamin's sack so they would be arrested as thieves. He is toying with them, his anger, his feelings of betrayal and loss come out in these mean and manipulative behaviors. And then, Joseph wept. He weeps for himself, for his own loss and his own feelings of being wronged, and of course, for his own bad behaviors, his bad choices. Joseph is a wreck. Even though, in this speech in chapter 45 he says it was God who sent him to Egypt, not the rotten brothers who sold him. He's been through a lot of loss, a lot of deprivation, and so he weeps. Then, in verse 9 he begins to turn. He turns from awareness of his own pettiness, and loss, and moves into vision. Joseph can see that God's protection, and care have been real during these very hard years, and he wants to extend that protection, to serve his people, and help them find a vision. He tells them to move the whole extended family to Goshen, where he will care for them, feed them, protect them. Most of all, he tells them to bring his father to him. And then he cries some more. And the brothers cry too.

What can we learn today from the bible as it reveals to us great sadness, unfair treatment and unpleasant choices? What can we learn for this moment in time, where God's world is in upheaval, and disarray, and we find ourselves filled with emotions we cannot place, and cannot categorize? I think we can weep, my friends, and find God's gift of strength and care in that weeping. We weep for all we have done, and what we have left undone. We weep for what we have witnessed, and for what we hold at a distance. But I think we must weep my friends, if we are to be able to pick up the responsibilities for what is next. The world needs us to be about service, and caring, and helping the ill, the homeless, the young, and the old. And, before we do that, I think we must weep. Feel the losses in your life, and in your world, and then resolve to do better. We can do that. The world needs us to do that. Amen.
