Bishop Laurie Larson Caesar Sermon for August 2, 2020The Feeding of the ... er...

5,000? My name is Bishop Laurie Larson Caesar and it's an honor to be here with you. I am so honored to be your bishop and be walking together with you as a synod - syn means "together" after all, and odos means "road," so we are on the road together. We are about a hundred and fifteen congregations and specialized ministries - campus ministries, new mission starts, hospice chaplaincies and many other places - federal prisons... We come together as people who are called to walk the way of Jesus in these challenging times. I wish I could be with you in person and I miss you. I find my heart and my body and my brain is missing being out among you, but it's so good at least we can connect this way. Thanks for joining, thanks for remaining connected to your church or specialized ministry. We need to show up now more than ever. This world needs love, one for another.

A person I loved died last month. He was tall and lean and older. He wore a sort of glasses from the 50's, had a huge heart, and a kind face. Christopher was a priest in the Catholic church. He was a pastor and a prophet and kind of a mystic. When he told me that he prayed for me, I believed him. He was one of those priests who yearned for more ecumenical connection, for women in the priesthood, who honored the voices of children and took them seriously. He was delightful. He would often, if we were ever in a context like Holden Village, wax on and on about the beauty of Spirit of Grace where I served, this Lutheran and Catholic faith community united in worship and life. He knew that when we cross bridges and learn about each other, we learn more about ourselves and the beauty of our tradition. In his unique way he was a model for me. The letters in the New Testament talk about "encouragement" as a gift of the Spirit. He showed me that. If he were around and I ever had doubts about whether to be brave for the sake of love or whether I could do something challenging he would say, "Pastor Laurie, you can do it - you can do almost anything with the God has called you and inspires you." I don't know if you have had any people like that in your lives, people who in all their glorious imperfections - maybe they wear outdated glasses or sported funny mustaches or bore wrinkled smiles - but if you have anyone like that, say their name out loud now. Maybe they helped you have confidence in a key moment in your life when you proposed to a partner or applied for a job or a school or needed confidence speaking out in the public square. They are not to be taken for granted - people who help us find our voice and our courage; they are gift and they are miracle of God. I think of people like Rose, Elton, Sylvia and Ove, and Herb, Joseph. I'm convinced the older I get the God of grace and liberation and absolute encouragement comes to us most often, or has come to me anyway, in the flesh of other people. I am also convinced that I've missed that gospel, missed paying attention, ten thousand times.

We buried Christopher in a graveyard in Mount Angel with prayers of gratitude to the God who made him. Now, when encouragement is needed more than ever, now as we are enduring social isolation in unprecedented ways ,and having some racial reckonings - examining the ways that white supremacy and genocide have been apart of this country that we love - we are invited to examine the ways we to have borne privilege when we didn't even see it and didn't even know it. When we are isolated and alone it's tremendously easy to give into anxiety and depression. Listen to the encouragers in your life right now. I want to talk about this text in Matthew because though it wouldn't be my choice to preach on, (I think we've all heard the feeding of the 5000 numerous times and think we know what's going on) I want to talk about how there's encouragement going on in this story, and how

we might hear it anew. First, in this chunk of text we are told that there were five thousand men. I do not know what was in the author's imagination, but don't we need to ask - how many women and children were there, unseen and uncounted? Not important? At the edges? Why don't we call it the Feeding of the 15,000? And does that have anything to do with people who are speaking out now, downtown, saying they are not seen or counted? Asking us to see that those who are called to "protect and serve" don't treat "my body exactly the same way as they treat your body? My body isn't seen as important as your white body? Please, listen to me. Your experience has been centered." I wouldn't be your bishop if we hadn't had people throughout the generations saying "Women count." 50 years ago we ordained our first women in the Lutheran church. Thanks be to God. Now in our culture we are at another moment. Will we listen? Let's get past the "title" and look at the text. In the first sentence we're told that after "Jesus had heard this"... The story isn't in the text but just before. He'd heard about the beheading of his friend and cousin John the Baptist at a banquet in Herod's palace. A sumptuous banquet full of dancing, fine wines, "power over" and a head on a plate. Then for Matthew, immediately what follows is a meal of abundance and inclusion and simplicity and care and equality with the 5000... It is like a "black mass" is followed by an all-comers BBQ. Hmmm. Contrast! Which one better reflects the kingdom of God I wonder? Jesus is likely grieving, probably fearful himself. Wants to be alone.

But somehow the people who have seen the transforming power of his being, his words, his presence, his God keep following and so when he arrives on the short there are many. Many. This is the only miracle story that makes all four Gospels. In other words, it's important! How to unpack. Sometimes, when I'm examining a text, I look at the verbs because the verbs can reveal things at the heart. What are the verbs at the end of the story? Once there is bread enough for all, Jesus "takes" it gently and "gives thanks", he "blesses", "sees the beauty", he acknowledges that all is gift of God For the bread to be eaten it needs to be "broken" and then we are told it is "given." Remind you of anything? This story at the center of all four gospels? I wonder in what ways those four verbs might reveal a model for our lives as well as our worship? Take. Bless. Break. Give. Will we allow our God to take us in the same way bread is taken and broken and given for the life of the world? So we've been taken and we've been broken. When I was twenty, I thought I was going to be a doctor because that's what you do when you are from a small town and you are good at science. People there wanted me to "succeed." They loved me. But, God had other plans. All that was cracked open for me when I was pursuing the dream. 22. A whisper and a call toward something I could love. All this invites me to ask now: What else is God yearning to crack open in me - privileges unseen, forgiveness unoffered, greed, ego, fear? Am I ready? And collectively, what is God trying to crack open in our church, how have we been blind, have we been complicit in horrors, how have we allowed our texts to be used to marginalize people who are meant to be sitting with everyone else feasting in an economy of grace and abundance? Are we willing to be bold and brave for the sake of that kind of cracking open? Easier said than done. A friend of mine once mused, thinking of the church, "What if the empty tomb is also a womb?" A cracking open to new life, out of death and fear and confinement? We are capable, people of God, of things that we cannot dare dream or imagine. We are called to listen and follow. The Christian Way simple sounds simple, and it's also terrifying. Listen. Love. Open. Change. Like in my friend Christopher. Notice the way, in the hands of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus invites others in, to participate in the miracle. It's an invitation but we can ignore it. Jesus asks the disciples to

feed the crowd. Ahhh! They say. What? Send them into the villages, that's where the bread is! But Jesus looks of the disciples, he's like, you all can do this. It is like my friend Christopher: "you're capable are more than you dare dream or imagine." They do not like it or get it. Send the people into the regular economy, that transactional thing where money changes hands, the villages. Jesus says "No, we have abundance here." And what's the true miracle? I love the commentary which asks - Which is the bigger miracle, Jesus Son of God multiplying loaves and fishes, or people living subsistence lives, always on the edge of hunger and even starvation, taking their hidden piece of bread or fish and sharing with everyone around them, so generously that whether you brought anything or not you eat until you cannot eat anymore. Until there are twelve baskets left over? I'm not sure how it happened there on the shores of the Sea of Galilee, or what literally transpired, but both are miraculous.

When we share, God's spirit is doing something in us because it goes against every grain of self-preservation and fear and anxiety in us. Something holy and transformational. Precisely at the heart of the story is this - we are called to live generously, to see the buds of possibility and Holy Spirit and strength and courage in others, so that we change, and become encouraged to become part of God's economy of grace. There where we see abundance and possibility in the other. There we are capable of admitting our little vision needs to be cracked open, our church needs to be cracked open, and our culture needs to be cracked open. Are we willing to walk into the unknown, with courage and grace and generosity enough to see abundance all around us and to name the ways we've been paralyzed by our own fear and blindness? Are we brave and bold enough to break open the bread of our lives - break open what we love so much that it can be shared? To name hard truths, to and risk the beheading John the Baptist got when he spoke truth to power? My dad used to say "I'm comfortable with Jesus being my savior, but am I comfortable Jesus being my Lord? Am I willing to go where he went, let HIM be my leader, risking everything to speak love into a world which prefers to marginalize and manage and monetize?

I was in a circle this week on Zoom where I heard from a young man who was kicked out of his home for being a member of the LGBTQ community. One person saw Spirit and potential in him. One Professor who said, "You are made in the image of God," and took him into her home, and invited him to be a part of her family and TA in her classes and LIVE. Thus began his amazing unfolding flourishing. THIS is the way we're called to be - this is the way we're called to act. I wish I knew her name because I would say her name. She's a model of this. She has been taken, blessed, broken open, and given for the life of the world and in that love and support and kindness, she is enabling this young person to also walk that fourfold path of Christ. Let's not forget that scripture tells us that "what humans see as impossible, with God, possible. With God all things are possible." Let's write it on our hearts and live it in our bones. Let's remember that we are beloved and called with courage to tell others they are as well. Let's weave a wild web of relationship grounded in God's grace so that we can act one with another and build the Beloved Community. Let's dare be taken and blessed and broken and given. Go in peace, my friends!
