Here's our topics for the next few weeks:

October 1 – Exodus 20:1-4, 7-9, 12-20 (The Ten Commandments)

October 8 - Exodus 32:1-14 (The Israelites forge a golden calf)

October 15 - Exodus 33:12-23 (The glory of God revealed to Moses)

October 22 - John 8:31-36 (Jesus says, Continue in my word and you will know the truth)

Beginning with Reformation Sunday, Oct 25, we will move to studying the Gospel for the coming week. It's been fun to use the semi continuous readings during the summer, so we could stay focused on one story – the founding of Israel as a people and eventually as a nation. Focusing on the Gospel for the school year is a great way to listen for "What God is Saying Today".

Sermon for Sunday Sept 27, 2020. I'd like to begin with a story. I purchased somethings from a store one, day, it was only me and the owner in the shop. He asked if that was all I needed, and I said, Yes, sir that's it. He grimaced, and said sir, don't call me sir. And I said, well I'm from the south, and we talk like this. He said, well, just don't call me sir. So, I said, As I said I'm from the south, I've got sir or ma'am. Which one do you want? He looked at me and said, "Well, we have a smart alecky customer". Well, yes, of course I'm smart alecky. But besides that - it does seem that we often reduce life to 2 choices left or right - up or down, conservative or liberal. And sometimes we see two choices in the Bible - Good or bad. Sin or righteousness. And I think both of our passages today are pointing us to see more than the simple on or off of the dichotomy of life - this way or the other way. Let's start with Moses. We've been reading Exodus for several weeks. Moses is a man with a problem. Millions of them - the Hebrews who complain about everything he does. Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die? They asked that last week, too and the one before, when they were crossing the Red sea on dry land only to see the Egyptians drowned on the same journey. The Hebrews might be said to have only two choices - stay in Egypt or go and risk it all by leaving. But there are lots of other choices, too. The choice to grumble about it and about Moses at each moment, or to find a way to be excited or even energized by new possibilities. There's a song from the 80s - should I stay or should I go? Life is more nuanced than that - there are a whole spectrum of choices, some of which deal with attitude more than circumstance. So let's look at the Gospel for today - Matthew 21, Jesus enters the temple, and immediately people in charge come up to badger him - "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" 24Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. Stop right here - what jesus is doing here is more important than what he is saying. - he's pointing out this adversarial choice from the temple leaders - its gotta be right or left, up or down, you're with us or against us. Well, I call bull on that whole argument. And so does Jesus. We're in a pandemic right now. We have also been in a horrific wildfire situation the last few weeks. And there was a fatal shooting a few blocks away from Holy Cross last week. And it was the 100th birthday of somebody wonderful. And my garden is pouring out tomatoes right now like nobody's business. The world is way more varied and nuanced my friend, and reducing our lives and our world to right and left - correct and wrong is just plain stupid. That's what the gospel says to me today - 28"What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' 29He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and

went. 30The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. 31Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. 32For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him." Jesus let's the leaders of the church have it between the eyes - Even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him. The point of the Christian life isn't about Knowing what is right -its about doing what is right. And that's a lot more nuanced than memorizing the right scriptures. Back to our Moses story of the exodus - before we pile on the Hebrews too severely, we should note that they are not only on a journey through the wilderness, they are also on a journey of the soul—being transformed from an earlier existence as an enslaved people to that of an independent nation. Moses stood before the people with his rod in his hand - the rod that God gave him, a rod that was something to lean on, at one point his rod turned into a serpent in the presence of Pharoah, and devoured the serpents of the other wise men, the rod was something to hold firmly and open the path in the red sea. When God works in our lives, God expects us to adapt - to weigh the fact, to discern the possibilities. The Authority that God gives each of you is different every breath - God is transforming each of us from an earlier existence as enslaved to sin to that of independent thinkers who can change the world. God is giving you each God's authority today and always, and we are all entranced by the way God works that out in each of you, in each of us. May we see beyond the two choices that humanity would force on us, and instead reach out in new ways to each new situation - in Christ's love. Amen.
