

What's Happening at Family Promise

As our turn in the Interfaith Hospitality Netword approaches (December 20th thru 26th), I wanted to let all of you know the changes happening at Family Promise as together we help families through a time of COVID-19, wildfires, and a housing shortage.

First, you should know **we rescued two newborn babes**, Kwan-Yin and Tyler from living in a car or the street earlier this fall. We are the first home these little ones have ever had. We are working with their parents to provide them with a better future. Thank you Holy Cross members for supporting the least in our community.

Our COVID response has suspended the practice of keeping families in churches. We don't expect that to change until late summer or early fall of 2021. No change will be made without active consent and participation of our church and other congregations in the network. So, **how do we shelter our families?**

When the pandemic hit, we housed our families in the Day Center. Then we rented Madison House so that our families could socially distance. Volunteer still provide meals delivered to the Day Center and to Madison House. This critical role not only provides home-cooked meals for our families, it reminds them that they are **connected to a larger community** that wishes them every success in achieving a home of their own. Thank you to all of you at Holy Cross who have helped change lives over the years.

In November, Family Promise was awarded a grant to provide support for families affected economically by COVID-19. The funds must be spent by December 30th. They have allowed us to help families in the following ways:

More families: We have temporarily expanded the number of families in the IHN program from 4 to 7. Currently, 5 families are staying in motels and 2 at Madison House. This allows **volunteers to continue our model of dropping off dinner at the Day Center and Madison House** four times a week. We will have our turn (with our partners Manantial and St. Timothy's) Christmas week.

Rental and Utility Assistance: Families may apply for help with past due rent or utility bills. This is aimed at keeping families stabilized in their existing housing as winter approaches.

Education: Family Promise is providing computers for students, who can schedule study time at the Day Center. That way families can have a quiet place for children to study, a hot spot to connect to school, and a place to recharge their electronics.

Family Promise continues to work with **wildfire evacuees,** and meets weekly with other agencies to find solutions for people made homeless by this disaster. Thank you to all who have contributed to helping our neighbors in the Canyon.

Through a partnership between *Saks Off Fifth* and National Family Promise, our local affiliate has received **hundreds of coats** to give to people in need. If you know someone who would benefit from a warm winter coat, please have them contact the Day Center at 503-370-9752.

In a year of adversity, Family Promise has adapted to the needs of the community. If you know of someone in need, or would like to help with our rotation week, please give me a call at 503-856-5151.

Doug Odell, Holy Cross IHN coordinator The Prophet Isaiah - In my early months serving as a hospital chaplain, I had a good supervisor. At the end of an awful day, where she had spent nearly the whole time with what was left of a family who had suffered a horrific accident and death, I brought her some tea, and said, "thought you'd need this at the end of one of the worst days ever". She smiled a bit and said, "It was their worst day ever" nodding over her shoulder at the family she had cared for in their grief and anger at their terrible loss. "For me, just another day at the office." Words I won't ever forget. These words from Isaiah 40 have that same feel for me. The Prophet Isaiah who writes these words to the Jews in exile in Babylon has that same feel to me. Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins. A chaplain's job in case I never bored you with the information, is not to convert anybody ever to any religion, but rather to uphold people in their own faith tradition when they find themselves torn apart by tragedy and loss. Isaiah is preaching to more than one group of people in this passage - he preaches to the Jews held in exile in Babylon, who are nearly without hope - all the jews they ever knew who were exiled never returned to their homeland. They surely picture for themselves a bleak future, and certainly a hard present. But, Isaiah's tone before this has been mostly punitive, finger shaking, head shaking, scolding. And the tone shifts at this moment - to one of comfort. Peace. The war for the hearts and minds of the people is over. I like to think God softened Isaiah's heart. The people of Judah the southern kingdom of Israel, had strayed far from God's purpose. Their kings were corrupt, their people had left behind their faith. And then the Babylonians came, in war, and took away thousands to exile, as slaves mostly. Was God punishing them? We will never know, but Isaiah certainly thought so. But here, the tone changes. Isaiah realizes his purpose, finally. He needed to find his place as chaplain to the people in exile. Not to wag his finger at them, but to lift them up. His job was to uphold them in their own faith system, helping them find their source of strength. Well, maybe you think I'm talking about me and all the chaplains I have known and admired. But I'm not. I'm talking about you. I know you. You have faith. You are loved by God and you know it. So, here in Advent, the beginning of the church year, and the very middle of the worst of the Pandemic we are living through, I am pointing out to you that you have a job to do. You must speak words of comfort to the hurting. You must speak tenderly to them, reminding them that this disease is not a punishment for anything. And that God is holding them, safe. Speak these words to each other friends, right now because for so many this is the worst time of their lives. And for you and me, its just another day at the office. Our whole job as Christians is to show Christ's love. Again and Again. So, let's do that. Our work is cut out for us and the folks need to hear it. From you. God bless you and your ministry, Amen. - Pastor Patricia Hughes

Communion Blessing


