Did You Know?

- African Americans make up approximately 2% of Oregon's current population
- The earliest documented evidence of a person of African heritage in Oregon was 1788.
- There are over 40 black pioneers buried at Salem's Pioneer Cemetery, on Commercial St.
- There have been four segregated schools for black children in Oregon. Salem's school was established in 1867 and was located at the current site of Macy's downtown.
- During the 1920s Oregon was noted to have the largest Klavern of the KKK west of the Mississippi River
- In 1851, a black man named Jacob Vanderpool was legally expelled from Oregon based on the state's Black Exclusion Laws.
- Reuben Shipley an ex-slave, in 1861 donated two acres of his land in Philomath to Benton County to be used as a cemetery (now called Mount Union Cemetery) on the condition that blacks could be buried there.

Sermon for the Oregon Synod Third Sunday after Epiphany January 24, 2021 Rev. Melissa O. Reed When I gave birth, twice, it was tension that both caused pain and also brought forth new life. I cannot say that I like tension. But, I have come to respect it as both a tell tale sign of when in Love we feel something is amiss in our lives or the world and the catalyst, the energy to move another possibility into reality. Tension can feel like many things, internally. Heartbreak, guilt, grief, yes pain, anger. My son struggles to complete his online homework, too many overwhelming steps, feeling isolated schooling from home in his first year of middle school, and I watch him struggle. And I feel tension. The love and dignity I feel and know for my child, and the way the world is, tools too few, resources scarce, teachers overworked, heartbroken themselves and far away. His brain, learning process neglected by the circumstances of these times. I am moved by Love's tension to drop my own work to come alongside him and wade through fractions and "new math." No, MOM. That is not how they taught us to do that. And, an hour later, and some tears, I've learned something and so has he.

Can you feel the tension in the first line of Mark's gospel story for this morning which comes sandwiched in the middle of chapter one? Now, after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God, has come near; repent, believe in the good news. The incarceration of a loved one pressed up against the good news of the reign of love! Mark doesn't drop that little nugget -- "Now after John was arrested" -as a random detail. No details are random in scripture, to be sure. Mark doesn't drop that bit to make the Jesus community he writes to comfortable. Complacent. No, Mark, drops that bit to tell the truth of the matter. THIS is the part of our story into which the kin-dom of God comes near. Into THESE histories Jesus' energy of Love troubles. To some listening ears in Mark's community in their own Galilees, they hear their own story of oppression -- they themselves shackled by empire, family members painted as criminal by their identities and/or their rabble rousing. To some, they wake up to their own story buried beneath the noise of distraction or privilege. And, to some ancestors, many many years later, there is a not so subtle or polite invitation to NOT neglect, negate, bury or dismiss any part of our stories as too far gone for Love to touch, and in that tension...for a new story to be born. For when love comes close pressing in and exposing what is antithetical to her, the energy is created for repentance, or in the Greek, metanoia...meaning change. In fact, it is not an invitation or a question at all. But the verbs there -- believe or better, trusting in God's love, the covenant God has made will all humanity, all creation, so God loved the cosmos, the whole damn thing -- and repent, change -- are imperatives! When love presses in and reveals what is wrong, she has an energy all her own to birth that new story, that new reality, that nwe kin-dom, that new world our hearts know to be true. I remember among Salt and Light Lutheran and Leaven Community -- when our members bravely shared their housing insecurities and we discovered that one of our core leaders needed housing, alongside a lot of others members and neighbors needing more affordable housing -- the tension of our love for one another and the brokenness of a system where humans are not dignified with good housing created tension that caused metanoia -- changed our way of thinking, opened up creativity... so we organized: someone had a tiny house to offer up, another had land to put it on, and we got our city commissioners to put a stay on the eviction of people in tiny homes and RV's on private property in the city of Portland. The Spirit of Love touched our pain and moved our bodies...and Our community got to come home! The kin-dom of God came near touching the very part of our story that seemed too far gone! You all, did you hear that gospel writer-poet-truth-weavernew-world doula, Amanda Gorman on Inauguration Day?! Did you hear this prophet?! She dropped truth left and right, deftly building tension alongside the way our hearts know it should be, must be, how it truly is... She didn't let us off the hook. She named it. When day comes we ask ourselves where can we find light in the never-ending shade? She said. The loss we carry a sea we must wade She said. We've braved the belly of the beast We've learned that quiet isn't always peace She said. And the norms and notions of what just is Isn't always just-ice She said And yet the dawn is ours she also said before we knew it somehow we do it she said Somehow we've weathered and witnessed a nation that isn't broken she said but simply unfinished. she said.

Now after John was arrested, they said the kingdom of God has come near, they said Truth doesn't let us off the hook, but it does, in love, propel us forward in new ways, world birthing ways. Later in the poem she says that America "is the past we step into and how we repair it." This past three months I have had the privilege of engaging a process with many of you -- with congregations across our state and our Synod -- of various background and denominations -- including about ten of our own, and a team from our Synod itself, as we have stepped into our collective past in order to repair it. We are listening and unearthing and sharing the hidden histories of communities within our state -how BIPOC communities have been historically enslaved, displaced, and white communities, including many church communities, have benefited from -- perpetrating and perpetuating this violence. As we have dug into the stories of the land and the peoples that lived there, how the earth became property and started benefiting some and neglecting others, I have wondered about my own familial land story. Land as property is how many families built and build wealth. And, thanks to my very curious brother, I learned that on my maternal great grandmother's side: one side of that family line owned people of African descent as slaves. And, the other side were abolitionists. They do not cancel one another out. But they press together in paradox. My family's wealth and privilege came from the enslavement of my black siblings' bodies and that truth still maims black siblings. That is the truth. When love touches that truth I experience deep tension that trusts, loves, believes that there must be another way... What if we continue to step into our collective past and weave these hidden histories of ours, particularly as people catalyzed by our faith. How much tension might we experience together until we must push? How much metanoia might come? What world might we birth? I look forward to catching the baby with you all. +Amen
