God Come Down - I am a person who enjoys travel. Perhaps you are, also. I own a Rick Steves backpack, and have become a person who packs everything for a two week trip in this backpack and one carry on bag. That means, I can jump on and off of a train without needing help with my "stuff". Ever since I started doing this, which is a Rick Steves suggestion (Rick is an ELCA Lutheran with a travel business in Washington state), I have looked at my own 'stuff' in my life with something of the same eye. What Stuff do I really need on a trip? In my home? In my life? These days of the Covid 19 pandemic have meant very little travel for most of us - as we attempt to keep infection at bay. But, perhaps yearning for travel brought some of these thoughts to mind for me this week as I studied our scripture for January 3rd. The first Chapter of the Gospel of John is a creation story, actually. A bit like Genesis 1, but quite unlike it in many ways. I think you are familiar with this text. In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. <sup>2</sup> He was in the beginning with God. <sup>3</sup> All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being 4 in him was life,[a] and the life was the light of all people. 5 The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. Are you surprised this is a Christmas text? The wonderful account in Luke of the journey to Bethlehem, and the birth of Jesus, visited by shepherds who were sent by angels is the essence of Christmas Eve. But, everything is connected. The son, Jesus was sent by a loving God, who yearns for humanity to flourish, to have the best life possible, and to be connected to their God. John chapter 1 goes on. 9 The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. [b] 10 He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. 11 He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. 12 But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, 13 who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

Everything is connected in John's gospel. God creates the world, and reaches out to the people of the world through this child, this flesh of his own flesh, God himself, in earthly form. He came to what was his own and his own people did not accept him. Well, suddenly we're moving from Christmas the gift of love from God all the way to the ministry of Jesus, with the world given the opportunity to align with him, to join with him, and be gifted power. Here, on this second Sunday of Christmas we journey all the way from creation to the ministry of Jesus on earth. But we're not finished yet. 14 And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, [1] full of grace and truth. 16 From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. 17 The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. Grace upon grace. That's the essence of Christ's birth. A loving God offers humanity the chance to draw near, to be part of Christ's loving mission on earth. I have shared a picture on our website, and facebook called the Isenheim Altarpiece, in Alsace, a little sliver of land where Germany and France join, a piece of land fought over for generations. That altarpiece, painted in the year before Luther started the Reformation, depicts the body of Jesus as he goes to the cross. His body is covered with sores, like from a plague. This piece of art was painted for the Monastery of St. Anthony, near this church, which specialized in caring for plague victims of that time, who were routinely covered in sores from the pandemic in their midst. And so, the artist, Matthias Grunewald, painted the savior, going to his death, covered in sores as well. Perhaps the pandemic sufferers of the day were able to connect with Jesus, God's son, whose life and death are gifts to the suffering. Perhaps you and I can find something to connect their as well. This Wednesday is the Feast of Epiphany, the day when the 3 wise men visited the baby Jesus, signifying that all nations come to this-God's son, a gift to us all. You and I are invited to accept this gift. God come down. To us. To be like us. To suffer like us. The gospel concludes: No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known. Amen. - Pastor Patricia Hughes
