An **Epiphany** is an "Aha!" moment. ... Often, an epiphany begins with a small, everyday occurrence or experience that becomes a "portal" toward a more important insight.


In the New Testament, Epiphany celebrates the visit of the Magi to the infant Jesus and his family, bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. But there story begins with what would have been for them an everyday occurrence.

Traditionally the Magi are thought to be astrologers. So it would have been an everyday occurrence for them to study the night sky. But on one particular night they see a new and much brighter star, the star of Bethlehem. Somehow the star leads them to Jerusalem where they meet with King Herod (the so-called "great").

Herod knows nothing of "a child to be born king of the Jews." But he is certainly interested. Who is this new born rival? His scribes find an obscure prophecy that points them to Bethlehem. On arrival the Magi bestow their gifts upon the holy family and set off for home by "another way," having been warned of Herod's evil intent to assassinate the potential arrival king, even though he is only an infant.

The Gospel readings for Sundays after Epiphany bring to our remembrance the stories where by God provided "aha moments" so that we might recognize the man Jesus as our Emmanuel, the one in whom God is with us. The Sundays after Epiphany call forth our praises and thanksgivings to God for his provision and renewal in the year past, and the promise of God's steadfast love the year ahead. God's ways are often beyond our understanding, yet he lifts up the weak and stoops to save his people. The Gospel of Mark, which will be our focus throughout the Sundays after Epiphany, shows us unmistakably how Jesus came as God among us "God among us," asserting God's sovereign over brokenness disease and death.
