January 19, 2021 - This week's visuals – a few notes from Pastor Patricia's desk

Monday is a day off for many Americans, in order to focus on the life and legacy of **Martin Luther King, Jr.** He wasn't perfect, of course, but I appreciate the focus a day 'off' gives people. Martin Luther King Jr was a black man during the Jim Crow years in America, an educated man, a pastor, who followed his father's career into ministry. He was able to learn from the nonviolent movement and Mahatma Gandhi that there was another way to change the world.

I grew up with great movies about the Roman Empire and even World War 2 – where societies fought over what was important in their world. When I think of MLK jr, I picture a man in jail (Letters from a Birmingham Jail is worth your time to read) for no reason except trying to speak out for someone weaker, poorer, or more disadvantaged.

In these days when I find people aware of how much they have lost in the current pandemic (freedom to travel, jobs, and of course, family members and friends, lost to death), I think we need to imagine how much we can share. One of my favorite stories about pastors is the one about **Robert Sylvester Graetz Jr.**. **Pastor Graetz just happened to be pastor of Trinity** Evangelical Lutheran, Montgomery, Alabama, during the bus boycott. (You remember Rosa Parks). He opened supported the boycott, and drove people to work and back during that time. That was what he thought God had called him to do. Drive his car, and give people a ride to work and back. Sounds pretty simple doesn't it?

I have some concerns about focusing on the white pastor in this week of remembering one of the few black men who are honored by society at large. But, MLK jr is a bit bigger than life for me. Pastor Graetz, well, he just drove his car.

When we are confronted in these times with fear surrounding us, choices can be hard, they can be scary. But, couldn't we all, each of us choose to drive a few people to work and back? That job doesn't call for a giant of a man, like MLK, Jr. Maybe you and I can do those jobs? Today, in our neighborhood, and with our community?

We'll be talking about community a lot in the weeks ahead (it's our focus in Lent, too). Think about what you could do for your community, won't you? God bless you Pastor Patricia+

Call. It was a Tuesday morning, so holy cross was a busy place, even in COVID-19 times. There were 4 or 5 folks around the bulding, watering plants, and getting the weekly mailout prepared. It was raining, so nothing much was happening outside but Loran stopped by the office to ask if I would talk to a man who he had run into outside the church. I almost asked a few questions, but then decided not to. I asked the gentleman into my office, he was wearing a mask, and so was I, and we didn't shake hands or anything. My dog Sassy barked at him twice, and then curled up at his feet as I asked him to sit in one of my chairs. I asked his name, Sam, and told him mine. He was hesitant, and talked just a bit about 'seeing so much that is bad'. I listened. Sam talked a few minutes about "all that he has seen". He paused a lot. Finally, I said, "Sam, are you alright?" He looked up at me then, in the eyes. "Yes, I, well I think I'm a babysitter. For God." I remember smiling at that, and I said something like, well I gotta hear more about that. As his story unfolded, he talked about walking the streets in our area of town nearly every night, beginning around 10. Sam said he just walked. And when he met people out on the streets he'd look them in the eye, and ask them, "Are you alright? Do you need anything?" Some people would try to get him to help them get drugs or liquor, he said, but he'd just shake his head at that. But if someone was hungry, he'd take them to get food. Sam said one man runs a store, and so he bought a few things to help him out. I asked a bit more about the bad things Sam said he saw. "People are so afraid. There's a lot of bad things happening.' And I realized I didn't need to know more. There are a lot of bad things happening. I asked Sam if he needed a bible, and he said a lady he met gave him one the other night. I told Sam I thought he was doing God's work, and I thanked him. And I asked if he would come see me again in a week or so. We prayed and he moved on. I thought about Samuel in the bible. Called over and over by a loving God, who finally learns to say, Speak, lord, for your servant is listening.

I thought about Philip in the gospel ⁵Philip found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found him about whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote, Jesus son of Joseph from Nazareth." The bible has no shortage of stories of Call. God has always called who he needs to be God's hands and feet on the planet, caring for people, offering kindness.

Until I sat with Sam that day this week, and heard him talk about what he sees, I wasn't really in touch with how the events of the world have touched me, and I think have touched you. We've seen bad things. When I close my eyes, sometimes I see that scaffolding that the mob erected outside the capitol - a noose, ready for a lynching. A visual meant to send terror into the hearts of our governing officials, just as it was used to terrorize our black brothers and sisters since shameful slavery days. Like Sam, you and I have seen things. Things are bad. I think we must admit to ourselves that we have all been terrorized in these past days. I should not be surprised that it seems God has called a man like Sam, to be a babysitter of the people out at night. To ask, are you all right? Do you need anything? And then to minister where he can. It's not so unusual to be called by God, after all. I have no doubt you are called, just as Sam is, and I am. We are called to be a witness in these times. And I'm thinking of a quote by another Sam I know, "It's like the great stories, the ones that really mattered. Full of darkness and danger they were, and sometimes you didn't want to know the end because how could the end be happy? How could the world go back to the way it was when so much bad has happened? But in the end, it's only a passing thing this shadow, even darkness must pass. A new day will come, and when the sun shines, it'll shine out the clearer. I know now folks in those stories had lots of chances of turning back, only they didn't. They kept going because they were holding on to something. That there's some good in this world, Mr. Frodo, and it's worth fighting for." Thank you friends, for living out your calling from God. Amen.-Pastor Patricia Hughes
