Pay Attention - Do you like short sermons? Or long ones? I see you smiling there. You are probably thinking, I like Good sermons. But, all things being equal, two good sermons, I'll take the shorter one. There's something about brevity that makes an impression. Well, friends that's the Gospel of Mark. And this year we're reading from that Gospel many Sundays - some times from John but that's because Mark is so short! And this week we listen to the familiar story, which we hear every year on the first Sunday of Lent - of Jesus being driven into the wilderness, where he is tempted by the devil. That same story is in Matthew and Luke, but much much longer, with lots more detail, so much detail you could make a movie out of just those accounts. And I know you're thinking about those details right now, a lot of you who know your bible pretty well, but don't do that. Stay in Mark. Here's why. Mark is Sargent Joe Friday to me so often - just the facts ma'am, he says when someone gets wordy. What are the facts? This is the Son of God, pay attention. Every week, in Bible study I have been saying that - it is the essence of the Gospel of Mark. Just the facts. But this reading today gives us those facts - right between the eyes - first - the Baptism, which we read before in early January – Jesus is baptized by John in the Jordan, and comes up out of the water, to see the heavens ripping apart and the voice of his father - "You are my Son, the Beloved; [a] with you I am well pleased. This is Power demonstrated. God - the God of all - exposes Jesus to be who he is - God's Son - Pay Attention! Next, right after the baptism, the spirit DRIVES him into the wilderness – with the wild beasts, and Satan Tempts him. And the Angels Wait on him. This is power - to be alone, in a desolate place, a place where nothing is the same, and every moment can be frightening and to withstand the tempting of the devil, while the angels hang out with you. This is Power. Even in frightening, upside down times. God's Son will survive 40 days on his own surrounded by evil. Pay Attention.

Friends, here's the message for our day and our time from the mouth of Mark the Gospel writer – Yes, you're enduring a terrible time. Disease, political shenanigans, wildfire, and now ice storms are the order of the day. The numbers of homeless are rising, the number of unemployed is skyrocketing and the hungry yearn to be fed. You and I Serve a God of Power. I don't know much, but I know that some of the things we've lost – seeing our loved ones, gathering for coffee and cake in the narthex after worship, receiving communion from the hands of your pastor, maybe these things needed to take a step back for awhile. Because our neighbors need us. They are hungry. They are cold. They are unemployed. They are crying out for help. And We have access to the Power of God –remember that? Mark's been trying to tell us. Power that is greater than the devil, greater than the earthly powers who think they run the world. What will we do about these great needs? We are Created for community my friends – to be part of a community, and to care for that community with the Power of God. I think its about darn time we act like it. Just the facts ma'am. We serve the Son of God Pay Attention! Amen. – Pastor Patricia Hughes

"You have a place at the table! All are welcome!"

In 2019 and early 2020, Holy Cross began to explore the possibility of becoming a "Reconciling In Christ" (RIC) congregation. A diverse group of members had expressed an interest during some committee meetings, the council and congregation was made aware of the interest, and a committee was formed to formally explore this possibility. That committee met, gathered information, questioned, learned and shared with the congregation along the way. And then, the pandemic hit. And like many things in our life, the RIC discussion was put on the back burner. The committee had planned that in April and May of 2020 the congregation would meet, discuss, learn and decide if we wanted to proceed to become a Reconciling In Christ congregation. Obviously, we were unable to hold those discussions and no decision was made.

So, here we are. A year later. And ready to bring this conversation to the forefront once again. I would like to take some time to share with you again, some of the basics about the RIC designation and again provide the opportunity to discuss this as a congregation and, eventually, to make a decision as the Holy Cross Congregation.

What does Reconciling In Christ mean? Reconciling In Christ began in 1983, as a way to recognize Lutheran congregations, synods, seminaries, and organizations that welcome people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. Where all people can find safe, nurturing and affirming settings in which to worship and learn. By the way, the ELCA does not stand alone. Other denominations have Welcoming Church Programs as well, including, the Episcopal, Presbyterian, American Baptist, Disciples of Christ, and United Methodist Churches.

Why is this important for Holy Cross Lutheran Church? If we decide to become an RIC congregation we will develop a welcome statement that communicates who we are as a congregation. It tells everyone that we are a diverse congregation and that everyone who walks through the doors will be welcomed. We invite members of the LGBTQ+ community, who are looking for a place to worship and a place to be welcomed to the table, to walk with us as we all walk our spiritual journey. This could impact someone who in the past may have found the words "all are welcome here" to mean everyone but them. It assures visitors that our welcome is genuine, not a hollow gesture and has no "strings attached".

What have we done so far? In late 2019 a committee was formed to explore becoming an RIC congregation. That committee consisted of Paula Fanshier, Jeff and Julie Sargent and Margo Jensen. We met and discussed the RIC designation using the document "Building an Inclusive Church". That document can be downloaded at

https://www.reconcilingworks.org/trainings/bic/. Paula and Margo attended a training in RIC in Portland and the committee used what we learned to move forward. We shared information with you at several short talks on Sunday, had a larger congregational discussion after church, and Pastor Patricia focused one of her Bible studies on RIC and what the Scripture tells us. This Bible study confirmed for us that Matthew 22:34-40, are the key verses that we lean into as we move forward in the RIC discussion.

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." And "You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

So, here we are once again. Ready to continue our discussions, and questionings and conversations. And, ultimately, to make a decision as to whether we believe Christ is asking us to be a Reconciling In Christ congregation. We don't know exactly what that will look like during this time of the pandemic. But, we will devise a way to make it happen. Please be ready in the next couple of months to participate in making this decision. All of our voices need to be heard. We are pretty sure you know what our voices are saying, but your voice is important as we finalize our decision. This decision will be made by the entire congregation and we will honor whatever the congregation decides to do.

We entrust ourselves and all our prayers to you, O faithful God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**


