One of the few things I remember from confirmation classes is sitting around a fire while the leader asked each of us "what is church?" I gave the obvious answer—where two or three are gathered in my [Christ's] name from Matthew 18:20.

I have pondered this memory over this last year as we have been sequestered in our homes and not able to gather as we could before. Yes, we have made adjustments. We have had church on the sofa in our pajamas watching and listening to a service. We have communed with God during extended nature walks. We have read the Bible through or worked individually to learn more about Christ. But none of these replace the community of the church.

Community is what binds us together. When we share a meal, when we share prayers in sorrow, and when we praise in times of joy, we are experiencing life together, and in doing so we share in God's love.

My community have changed many times over my life. I don't remember the church where my parents were married and I was baptized, but I do remember the church that I grew up in. I knew that building inside and out. The people there were my family. In the church, I learned about God and was confirmed. I also learned how to hotwire a car, but that's a different story. To the point though, the people I saw on Sunday I also saw during the week. We camped and picnicked together, we celebrated life events together, and we came together to chase cattle or become an emergency babysitter. We were there for each other. That community became an integral part of my life that continues today.

But life goes on, and I moved. After college, I searched for a new church community. I drifted until I found a church in Portland. I was only there for a year—and I only attended regularly to avoid an annoying guy in my apartment complex— but that church welcomed me and reminded me that I was a part of "the Church," even if I hadn't found "my" church. When I returned to Salem, I attended a few churches until I found Holy Cross. It was a comfortable fit.

I once again had the community of my church. In this church, I have formed many friendships. I met my husband through this church. I have slept on church floors during youth trips, shared meals, and watched the children of the congregation grow. I raised my children here. And as before, this community spilled into my whole life. Much of my social life revolves around people I met in and through Holy Cross. I have gone to movies, played games, attended sporting events, and shared many meals. This church family has also

fed me when I was ill, picked me up from train stations, and boxed up my house for moving several times. It is my community.

When Doug and I were looking for a new house, we considered other towns, but realized that we were not ready to leave Salem. Our lives revolve around our church and this town. This is our community. However, at some point even this will change. We may retire to Arizona, or need more long-term care than we can give each other in our home. Our friend's lives will also change. Life has a way of moving on. Like the people in the church of my youth, many friendships will endure and some will fade. Even when we don't see or feel the change, it is happening. Our children are growing and leaving the nest. Our mentors and role models are no longer as active, or are no longer with us. Change comes even though we are in the same church. I have lost many friends, but also gained new ones. My community and my church will continue to change. God is the only constant.

Church and Marketplace - Here in Salem one of the big rites of spring is when Saturday market opens up. In this Covid year, they are opening early, this week actually. I love Saturday market, although there's also a smaller one in Silverton year round that I rarely miss. What's good about a market place? Lots of people selling, different things, often fresh things - Buying and selling, people all around - that's got it's own energy doesn't it? But why is there a marketplace in John chapter 2? This reading from the Gospel is called the Cleansing of the Temple, and its in all 4 gospels, but in John, only John, ¹⁶He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" Mark's gospel says, "You are making my father's house a den of robbers. That's different. In John Jesus isn't saying, you're cheating people, taking a cut-making them spend too much money on these sacrifices. No, in John Jesus is saying that the very business of the temple - the sacrifices offered - are not of God. In Bible Study this week we talked about this-imagining the temple that amazing edifice newly restored by Herod - Gold on the pillars, the whole thing twice as big as before, so huge retaining walls and more - it was fabulous. the court of the gentiles, where the buying and selling of items suitable for sacrifice, the changing of roman money into temple money appropriate for the purchase of said sacrifice animals. That all happened in the court of the gentiles - and the main workers there - were priests - in their official priestly garb. Yes, I think you might be a little disgusted with that visual, too. Stop making my father's house a marketplace. Then he goes further, when the powerful people in the temple complain, and says, tear down this temple and in 3 days I will rebuild it. What? It took 46 years to build this temple? But John the gospel writer explains that he was speaking of his body as the temple. What are you and I to do with this radical gospel reading smack in the middle of Lent during a Pandemic? This year, when we have fasted from so much of our church life - little or no inperson worship, no singing together, no fellowship time with coffee and cookies as the organ plays the postlude. And we read Jesus telling these priests selling doves for sacrificial use - stop making my father's house a marketplace. Stop doing it this way. Worshipping God was never supposed to be like this. You see, I think john the gospel writer is saying more than don't make a profit off of religion -I think he is saying the way you are practicing your religion is not how God wants you to practice it now. Jesus' point - my body, the scourging, torture and death that my body will go through is the only point. The fact that God will raise that beaten and tortured body from the dead in 3 days is the point. Being a Lutheran is important to me. I've always been kind of proud to be part of a group who, 500 years ago said, the way we're doing church wasn't right. We had drifted from the main point - faith in God, not earning salvation through good works. That's why Jesus died, and his father God raised him, to free us to change the world through following God's Son. Do you think there's a chance that this pandemic has given us another reset point? Do we need church the way we had it before Covid19 threw a monkey wrench into our lives? Have we spent our time enjoying the togetherness of worshipping with like minded people, and failed to address the deep poverty and need of our neighbors? Christianity is practiced in so many ways in our neighborhoods - but we tend to circle the wagons and worship just with people who think like us, or sadly, are the same ethnicity as us. The Exodus passage for this week is the ten commandments. And the 3rd commandment is clear - remember the sabbath day and keep it holy, in remembrance that we serve the creator of the world, who took 6 days to make the heavens and the earth and rested, and saw that it was good on the 7th. What will it look like, after the pandemic, to keep the sabbath day holy? My friends, we have a little time as we get closer every day to the ability to have church worship in the way we did before the Pandemic changed our lives beginning on March 15, 2020. Be in prayer, won't you, and in conversation with other people of faith, and imagine what's next for the church of God, for Holy Cross church in Salem, Oregon? As we follow this man of God, who gave all for our salvation. Amen. - Pastor Patricia Hughes+


