Lifted Up - I miss the sanctuary. For lots of reasons, worshipping in the gym has been a safer choice in these covid times. The garden outside is even better, but it is Oregon. And it is due to rain again today. But in the sanctuary, we have in the front of the church, the chancel, its about 6 inches higher than the floor in the rest of the sanctuary. And the ambo, where we read the scripture is higher still, another 6 inches or so. And so when we are about the business of worship the people in the pews, that's you good folks, are looking up, just a bit, necks are up, the angle is definitely up. When we went to Germany, we saw the pulpits of those churches had the preacher 20 feet above the people, sometimes, so looking up for them was an understatement. The Gospel today begins And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up. You see, the story out of the old testament book of numbers is an important baseline for us. People have been bitten, and are dying from the bite of a poisonous snake, it's the time of the great exodus of the Jews from Egypt, and Moses is their leader. But he cannot save them from these poisonous bites. And the Lord God tells Moses to make a serpent out of bronze, and lift it up on a pole for all the people to see. The backstory about this is very old testament. The people had been grumbling, and complaining about God's leading them through the desert. God sends the snakes among them. And they suffer. But it's been a hard year for Israelites, and they realize now their own willfulness, their own rejection of God's love and care. Therefore, the bronze snake is lifted up, and the people who are dying from the venom of these awful snakes, will look up and live.

It's an ancient story, in some ways almost a tribal one. People will grumble. I grumble. People will resent God's leading. I resent God's leading. I have a feeling you do too. It's been a pretty awful year for most of us, in many ways. Grief. Loss. Uncertainty. Pain. Sounds a lot like the Israelites following Moses. Sounds a lot like the Jews living under the heel of the Roman empire, back 2000 years ago, too. Eeking out a living with very little say about their own life's path, uncertainty is the only certainty. Grumbling. It's everywhere in the gospels. But then we come to John the 3rd chapter - And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up. Those who are suffering, those who have been grumbling, look up and live. And gaze on Jesus the Son of Man, not a symbol made of bronze, but a living breathing, hurting, bleeding person, who will suffer and die willingly, for these grumbling people. For you and for me. It is the person of Jesus Christ, the blood and flesh, the breathing and the living person, God taken on human form completely, with all the pain and wonder that entails. This human being, whose life we follow as we read the gospels, is the same one who will do the dying. So that we don't have to. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness so must the Son of Man be lifted up. It's lent, my friends, after a year of loss and death. There is a sunrise coming, Easter is just weeks away. In our Lenten Journey, we walk through these realities of grumbling, and pain, loss and sacrifice, to bring us to worship together, looking up, not at me, or even at the altar, but at the person and sacrifice of Jesus Christ. Why? Why does God do this for us? "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. New Life in Christ. That's why we gather, my friends. That's the message we carry to the world. Amen - Pastor Patricia Hughes


Your mercy is great.
