Council Thoughts from Gail Struve:

Music and the space we create in our worship is one of the most important pieces to our worship, our communion with God and our relationship with each other. When done well, music becomes the breath of God and creates wholeness for our gatherings. Music is one of the strengths of our worship at Holy Cross and has always been led with talent and care, so much so that many parishioners are able to focus on the spiritual connection and not the logistics of how it is done.

Other than the musicians who are involved with planning, choir members, organists, and sound assistants, do the parishioners who come to worship really know what it takes to organize, prepare and problem solve? Do you, as you read this, notice the work and efforts that go behind the beauty? Don't get me wrong, those of us involved in anything related to our music at church have received many thanks and appreciation for the gifts of our music and we are happy to share our love of music with the congregation. But love of music and talent alone do need additional support, planning and some level of technology.

This past year was not unique in terms of the musicians at Holy Cross working on creative ideas to continue providing music for our worship. Before Covid-19, we had used music in creative ways during worship and tried to provide variety including use of the organ, piano, guitar, handbells, voice choir, soloists and special instrumental solos such as violin, flute and brass instruments on occasion. We have also worked on speakers and sound system improvements for the sanctuary prior to Covid-19. Occasionally we had even had worship with piano and handbells in the Gym.

This year, creativity, faith, patience and flexibility were tested for all the musicians at Holy Cross due to Covid-19. Choir sang with masks on to record music, 6 feet away from each other, 30 feet from anyone in line with their voice and only sang as a solo for any in-person worship whether inside or outside. We held on to our faith and hope by a thread for better days when we can sing with our shoulders touching again and without the mask being sucked into our mouths as we take breaths between phrases. Yet we have persevered, offering what we can, and fighting through the discomforts to give whatever we could, because those discomforts pale in comparison to what Jesus did for us, and we love music that much.... that we will work though struggles just to share it.

We are without a permanent organist at Holy Cross currently and maybe that has gone almost unnoticed with the chaos of Covid-19 and worshipping outside and in the gym. We have enjoyed having Tim Bibleheimer play the organ on a couple occasions, but we have only been able to have the organ played a couple times this past year. Sheila and I are currently starting to share the playing of piano for services, which works for now with only 2 services per month indoors. We are happy to continue for a little while, but for how long? I know that Sheila and I are thinking of new ideas for how we support voices with piano and organ. We will figure things out as we go, but as life moves forward, we ask for continued grace, patience, flexibility and creativity....and a whole lot of prayer. Can you help us also imagine some new things and new ideas?

We also dealt with challenges of technology and stretched our equipment as far as we could with what and who we had available. There have been unique challenges in placing speakers outside that covered both the courtyard and parking lot last summer, and indoors connecting and finding enough

cords to run the length of the gym to connect to the amps and speakers while maintaining a 30-foot distance from the singer to the congregation (a necessary precaution for COVID-19). Our sound equipment was enough to cover meetings and the sanctuary for how we have conducted worship and meetings in the past, pre-COVID. It was barely enough to cover what we need for "distanced" worship.

We currently do provide recordings of our services with a personal video camera that is later downloaded to the internet, thanks to Gary Strand and we have recordings of Sermons and prayers from pastor through her Microsoft Surface. Honestly for equipment that is easily accessible it is not too bad for making things work, but I think if we were to imagine longer term and future technology, we would explore more professional equipment that would give us more possibilities.

Wouldn't it be nice to have equipment that could provide a high-quality live stream to the internet, web site and social media? What about monitors that could show that live feed to parents in the nursery, parishioners in the narthex who need some separate space or are setting up coffee for fellowship after service? Those are just a couple things to technology to consider that could enhance our worship, increase accessibility to our worship and simplify our processes (it takes time after recording to download the content to the internet). We also get by with the technology at our church because we have just enough human resources to make it work, but perhaps we need to explore and research the possibilities of new sound and video technology, and who is going to do that? Pastor is already giving so much of her time and although she has learned new technology to help us record, her primary focus is Pastoral ministry, not Information Technology Manager.

We have faith that this way of current worship is still temporary, even though it feels a lot longer than temporary, but if you were to imagine this as a longer-term situation or permanent, would our technology be enough?

We do not know what the future holds for Holy Cross, how long it will be for "normal worship" to fully return (meaning every Sunday in the sanctuary), or what changes we may have in our music program as the future unfolds. To many in our congregation we just want to be back in our comfortable pews, listening to the music and singing along to familiar hymns. Yet we know that we must also grow and change.

As we take steps this spring to gradually have a presence back in our sanctuary, let us return as new children of God, resting in his comfort with healing, hope and vision.

What Return Can I Make? What I miss most are the conversations. These pandemic months have been hard on all of us - and of course, our isolation is really small potatoes when you think of the 500,000 dead, and all their families who grieve. And, the list goes on-families impacted by job loss due to the pandemic, folks who have had evictions postponed by law, will someday, inevitably be confronted with all those past due bills. What will happen to them? So, I feel pretty selfish when I tell you I miss conversations with you all. But miss them I do. I miss hearing your perspectives on caring for your neighbors, I miss the stories you tell about the way you serve your community. One of the facets of my job as your pastor, is to reflect back to you the issues you are struggling with, and also to bring up intersections of your life and character that you haven't thought of yet sometimes in a sermon. But I don't conjure those sermons out of thin air - they grow out of the scripture God gave us and my conversations and interactions with all of you, as well as our neighbors. In my workweek as your pastor, I am beginning to have small moments with folks - at bible study - Wednesday Lenten worship on zoom - recording music and readings with some of you. And I am thankful. We were not created to live a life where our thoughts only bounce around inside our own skulls. Relationship is a key factor in becoming faithful followers of Christ. Our Gospel for today could be titled - inside and outside Peter's head. This account takes place during Jesus' ministry in Galilee - where he's been healing and feeding and preaching to thousands - he's a rock star, and the crowds are big, and the disciples are in awe of being part of Jesus' inner circle. But Jesus pauses in this victory lap to tell the disciples privately that the time is coming when he will suffer and be rejected by the chief priests and scribes, be killed and rise again in 3 days. Peter stops him, pulls him aside, and says this isn't the message we want - stop talking like this. And Jesus shuts him down. Get behind me Satan, you are missing the whole point of this ministry. Its hard to watch this interchange, because we have all been Peter at some point, haven't we - when we have been so focused on our own discomfort that we miss the point - Jesus life death and resurrection brings the realization that following our savior means being focused on others, and not ourselves. This rebuke is so painful to watch, that its easy to stop here, and not read on in this Gospel, but we must. Because Jesus takes this moment of stopping Peter cold in his misunderstanding of the mission of the Son of Man, that he turns to the entire crowd that is following him, who've been loving the healing, and the feeding and preaching, to clue them all in on the life changing message of Jesus the Christ. That message is about others. What does it profit a person to gain the whole world and forfeit their life. "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. The cross is a well-known method of executing anyone who opposes the Roman empire in Jesus' day. Jesus saying, Take up their cross would be a vivid image - of risking opposing the most powerful entity in the world. This ministry of Jesus in Galilee with all the healing, all the feeding, is about more than just good vibrations - good feelings - its about community. Do you see that? Jesus says, Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? As we have each experienced these losses this year - the loss of human interaction with our friends and neighbors, and have grieved that loss, can we as a congregation, and as individuals recognize with Peter, that the point of that human connection isn't the good feelings it gives us, the point is what return can I make? This planet is populated with millions of people, each loved and cherished by the God who made them. How can my interaction with the world reflect God's love? What return can I make? What is the goal of this transaction of connection with others? Is it just my own enjoyment of the interaction? Or is there more? During this pandemic, I miss the conversations, with you, with our neighbors, with people I have never met before. As we begin to reclaim interpersonal connections, as vaccinations proliferate, and we tentatively move towards contact and connections with people, can this be our goal? Not just the relief and joy we feel at connecting with others again, but a true recognition that our purpose on this earth as followers of Christ is to see, and feel what our neighbors experience, and begin to plan what return can I make as a follower of Jesus? Family Promise 2020 Year in Review

Here is a summary of what we did together with other congregations in 2020:

Impact in 2020: Family Promise had to change its model in March of 2020 due to COVID-19. We were no longer in the congregations, but in motels. Soon the Day Center was converted over to a shelter, and we **rented Madison House** so we could maintain safe distancing protocols for the families. The **wildfires** came in September and put more stress on families with insecure housing. Congregations stepped up and helped 7 families instead of the usual 4 during the months of November and December, ensuring more families were safe and warm. Despite all the challenges 2020 had to offer, we as Family Promise were able to give **one-time assistance to 250 people** and help **another 250 people** with CARES funding. We also kept **163 people stable** in current housing, a 96% success rate. We found that the average family we helped was \$1100 behind on rent and \$300 behind on utilities.

Returning to IHN model: Gauging from the current progress in vaccinations, Family Promise do not foresee a return to our original IHN model in the next few months. We anticipate that at some time in the summer we will begin the process of **recruitment**, looking for commitment from the volunteers, the pastoral leadership, and the lay representation from each congregation. We won't start up the rotation process until **13 congregations** are ready to move forward. In this process we will visit, listen, present, and inform, working together to achieve our goal of housing children and their families. We will also look for **partnership congregations** to help existing congregations with the work.

Family Highlights of 2020:

William and Banesa: This past year we helped a family of 8 find housing, not something easily accomplished in the best of times. It took several months, but William and Banesa and their 6 kids are in their own home in the valley.

Newborns: Tyler was born while his family lived in a car. Kwan-Yin was born during the wildfires. Both infants' first safe shelter was with Family Promise. Both families have since found permanent homes.

Paying Forward: Another family, Alexis & Robert with their daughter Rayleigh found a place to live through Family Promise. A couple months later they showed their appreciation by helping Kwan-Yin's family move into the same apartment complex.

Connections: With COVID restrictions, volunteers primarily encouraged and inspired families by preparing meals. When Maxwell and his family moved on from IHN they said they would **miss the meals the most.** Volunteers also acknowledged birthdays and Christmas, put encouraging notes in with the meals, sponsored pizza nights, gave a special day at Waterfront Park complete with carousel rides, and provided Chromebooks so the children could attend school.
