From the Pastor's desk -

Folks, I have made the decision to retire effective August 1, 2021. I know this is probably a surprise to some, and not so much to others. I remember so fondly when I was interviewing for the call to Holy Cross Lutheran that I was asked how long I might be willing to give Holy Cross as pastor. I said I would shoot for 5 years. Well, we passed 7 years last January 5th, and I will turn 65 years old this August. It is time for me to retire. Although I am glad to say that I'm a very healthy person, I'm just not as sharp as I'd like to be. The office of pastor is demanding in several ways, and of course the pandemic has pushed all of us to adapt and perform in new arenas. Though it has been wonderful serving you, I am going to end my career as your Pastor before my performance suffers too much.

The leadership of Holy Cross is a miraculous thing to me. I have served with Councils, and Council Officers that have surprised me with their dedication and caring again and again. I am pleased to say that the leadership of Holy Cross continues to put serving the cause of Christ and Christ's people at the forefront of their planning for the future.

What will that future look like at Holy Cross? Well, the Bishop is aware of my plan, and she and her staff will support the leadership with pastoral staffing to meet your needs. She, and the whole Synod staff will, however, take their cues from you, and your desire for ministry in this little corner of NE Salem. We (you, and I) have spent the last 7 ½ years talking about our ministry here. I am proud of your choices and commitments to mission. The pandemic has pushed us a lot this past 14 months, and, since many things had to happen, "on the fly" my pastoral role has changed. I have only been able to visit our most elderly folks when pandemic conditions have allowed that to happen. I will focus on that area of visitation in the next couple of months, as conditions allow.

The possibilities for Holy Cross' future include new avenues of investment in the community through Family Promise and their collaborative vision for the property we know as the Easter House. That's exciting. We have collaborated with Christ the Good Shepherd and St. Mark's in many ways over these years, and new possibilities may emerge there. We have collaborated with Manantial de Aguas Vivas to reach out to our Hispanic neighbors, and there are more opportunities there. We have connected with the 10 churches in our part of town (the Stronger Together churches) to create an advent worship event and to try to address the needs of our neighborhood from a shared viewpoint.

Holy Cross has, however, always been about the people, and their mission to show God's love to all. Whatever choices you make in the next phase of your life will certainly continue to honor that purpose. I will be praying for you all.

Pastor Joe (my husband) continues to serve Peace Lutheran Church, in West Salem, and we will continue to make our home at the little 'farmlet' we bought in Silverton about 18 months ago. We will continue to be your neighbors, though I will worship somewhere else (that's going to be a hard choice, of course). The leadership of the ELCA has always insisted that each pastor, as they leave a church they serve, must move their membership, and step back from participation there in order that incoming pastors are able to make a healthy connection with the congregation. It is important to me that you and your pastors-yet-to-come have the best possible opportunity to thrive together.

My last Sunday will be August 1, 2021, and it is my hope that you will pick up the phone, or write me a note or email between now and that time. Each of you matter to me, and I have been enriched by our collaboration together.


Our next Racial Justice Gathering will focus on Anti Asian racism. Our guest will be Carrie Lee Brown, a retired school counselor.

A Ball Of Yarn - A few years ago, at a Fly meeting - that's faithful Lutheran youth - Sarah Schultz, she was Tolleson then, brought a skein of yarn, and she held the end and tossed it to one of the young people. Say your name, she said, and one food you refuse to eat, then toss it to the next person. Well, that young person did as he was asked, and tossed it away, holding on to the piece of yarn, as he went on to the next person. Well, you guessed it, at the end of that game, we had to go backwards, repeating people's names as we unraveled the spiders web of yarn we had just made. But of course, there were more games with the yarn, and people's names and learning things about them, until we were a huge tangle of yarn. We played that game right here, in the Holy Cross gym, and many other games. From her experiences as a camp counselor, and in other venues in her life, Sarah had a million games designed to learn more about each other, and to have fun all the time. We played a lot of games right here. The kids learned more about each other, they began to forget that some kids came from St. Marks and some from Christ the Good shepherd and some from Holy Cross. They just hung out together and sometimes we did things that helped other people, too. I've read the Gospel for today, from John 15, over and over this week, in the two bible studies we have, and on my own. I am the vine, you are the branches, Jesus says. It's an intimate moment in the gospel, just Jesus and his disciples. He's preparing them to do ministry without him. Because he knows that is coming. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Jesus is creating the church as he speaks with the disciples. That makes me smile. Because I love the church, despite all of our flaws, and foibles. The church Jesus is creating is alive, because of their connection to Jesus, and to God the father. However, Jesus is doing more than getting to know you games with the disciples, and with us. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned I've thought a lot this week about what this means. When we become disconnected from God's love and power, that's a choice, and, according to this passage, that will lead to our branches withering, and dropping off. Ultimately, those dead branches make their way to the fire. But what does being disconnected from God's love look like? For the church? For you and me? Well, disconnected that's something I've experienced more this past year than ever before. How about you? And as much as I enjoy time alone, this year has taught me a lot - I don't like being disconnected - I miss before church banter in the narthex, I miss visiting our elders who live in residential care. And I've discovered I really miss the small connections with the ministries and activities who all use Holy Cross buildings. I miss waving at the AA group every Thursday evening when I was here. I miss hearing the music of Manantial de Aguas Vivas when they hold worship in the sanctuary. I even miss the Zumba music as the group exercises in our gym. Small things, I suppose, but the community here at Sunnyview and Lansing are part of us. And we are part of them. I miss handing out coats at the coat drive in the fall. I don't think its an exaggeration when I say that these covid times have left me and also Holy Cross feeling withered at times. The love and care of Christ that we preach and study together has not had much of an outlet lately. The withering is real. But I cannot lay this withering entirely at the feet of a pandemic. We, here at Holy Cross, and, surely in other churches, have felt our connection to those in need to droop a bit. Our familiar patterns of school supplies, coat drives, even thanksgiving eve dinners has been unavailable to us. But the need continues. All you have to do is look in our parking lot to see how much need is out there. We have two families, who lost so much in the labor day fires, who continue to live in our parking lot, as they attempt to make new connections, and new possibilities happen. So, what's your point, Pastor P? That sadness you and I feel, the disconnection from pandemic necessity? Well, it is possible that's the future. For the church. For Holy Cross. Unless we make new connections of caring. The need is there - and the yarn has been tossed to us. It's our job to keep it going. How will God use us in the future? The answer is within you. We must be connectors of grace and care to those in need. Now, not after the pandemic. And your participation is the key. Jesus says, ⁸My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples." - Pastor Patricia Hughes

Hear us, O God.


Your mercy is great.
