The Nature of God -

Todays readings from the bible are about one simple thing - the nature of God. Yep. Its true. Sometimes the sermon, which flows from the readings, of course, are about living your life, caring for your neighbors, living a life of purpose - all good things that we need to hear. But today, the nature of God is front and center. And, before you close this video, think on this - the nature of God is directly related to us because God sets the tone for our lives through God's relationship with us. Okay, enough words - let's move to pictures. Can you picture with me, the disciples and Jesus on a boat on the sea of galilee? They have been busy - healing, feeding, caring for the multitudes that have begun to follow Jesus everywhere. Jesus tells the disciples that he will be talking in parables for those folks, because they are not yet ready for the straightforward speech he gives the disciples. He flatters the disciples a bit there, encouraging them, I think to stand up a little straighter, yep we understand Jesus. We get it. We're not like the crowds - we know the truth about Jesus. And then, picture with me, they are in the fishing boat, out on the lake which is very deep, and storms are intense, and a storm comes, and they fear for their lives. They wake the sleeping Jesus, yes that's right, sleeping, not worried, not fearful, and say do you not care that we are about to die? And he stills the storm. With a word. And the disciples look around at each other and say, "Who is this, then that even the wind and sea obey him." And now we see that the disciples don't understand the nature of Jesus whom they follow. They are very like the multitudes who gather to hear him, gathering joyfully to be near to Jesus the healer, the feeder of many. But, what do they understand about this man, and what do they understand about God? This reading is juxtaposed with a stirring speech from God in the book of Job, which is an ancient book, and somewhat harder to read than the gospel. But, who can fail to be touched by God's words 4"Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth? Tell me, if you have understanding." God is God, and we are not. Sounds simple doesn't it? But, it seems to me that we humans struggle with this again and again, to our own loss. I'm not promoting fatalism, just giving up in the face of a powerful God, but I am promoting awareness, because I think knowing that God is God and we are not is a very freeing thing. Just weeks ago, we celebrated Pentecost, that day when the disciples finally understood that Jesus had returned to God's heaven, but had not abandoned them, but rather, sent the holy spirit, the comforter, to assist them all as they lived out God's mission on earth. And, that mission is Hope. Hope not just for themselves, nor is it just for you and I. Hope is our mission to give to the world, and the nature of God is key. What does this mean?

Have you ever been really frightened? Like, lost your job and no hope out there frightened? Like, your house and contents burned up in the Labor day fires frightened? I have, and I meet people all the time who are in that moment, or have been in that moment. What is our response? What was your response when it happened to you? These are life defining moments. We are best served, I believe, by feeling the terror, and then putting one foot in front of the other, to take steps forward, past the catastrophe. In his book, Your God is Too Small, JB Philips writes, [Some Christians] prevent themselves from growing up. So long as they imagine that God is saying 'Come unto Me" when He is really saying "Go out in My Name," they are preventing themselves from ever putting on spiritual muscle, or developing the right sort of independence quite apart from the fact that they achieve very little for the cause to which they believe they are devoted. Today, my friends, I ask you to contemplate the nature of God. And, the fellowship of the family of faith God has given us. If, for you, as a believer, you can take note that God is God, now and forever, we may go forth in that name, to change the world. With our own efforts. With the support and care of our family of faith. Amen. – Pastor Patricia Hughes
