From your Council President - June 8, 2021

I hope you all had wonderful Memorial Day weekend and are enjoying the much-needed rain after a very dry April & May. I know our yard sure could use the water!

Weather permitting, we will be holding our first outdoor service this Sunday, **June 13 at 10:00 AM** in the Courtyard. Volunteers for many of the tasks are still needed along with **RSVPs** if you are planning on attending. Please call Janet in the church office (503) 364-6041.

We will continue to sit in our "pods" social distanced (6 feet) from each other, but for the first time since Covid-19 began we will NOT be requiring the use of masks, following the new Oregon Health Authority (OHA) guidelines for outdoor gatherings. Please note that the OHA still urges unvaccinated people to continue to wear masks for their own protection. Also note that if it rains, we will move indoors which will require the wearing of your masks.

Following the service, we will hold a Congregational Meeting to discuss and vote on two separate issues. One is the Family Promise proposal to purchase the Easter House and vacant lot. The second is to review and vote on the adoption of the Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Welcoming Statement.

Please contact me directly prior to Sunday if you will not be attending the outdoor service/meeting and have any questions or concerns about our new mask policy or the two votes we will be conducting.

Sunday is just the beginning of a busy and eventful summer. As you know our beloved *Pastor is retiring on August 1st* and we are beginning the transition period. Transitions are a part of life, filled with both challenges and opportunities. For Holy Cross, this comes at a time where we need to reconnect with the world we live in, reflect on where we have been, assess our congregational vitality and sustainability and determine what path we wish to tread in the future.

There are three major phases during this journey with some twenty-seven steps sprinkled among them. We have just begun Phase I (Our minister is leaving. What do we do?). We will be in this phase the rest of summer before commencing Phase II (Intentional Interim and Self-Study) in the Fall.

In Phase II a Transition Team will be formed to ask questions of the congregation. This Team will be responsible for research, analysis, documentation, and study. It will develop the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) of Holy Cross Lutheran Church. To successfully navigate the transition period, the congregation should pay close attention to these Five Focus Points: Heritage, Leadership, Connections, Mission, and Future.


The time spent in Phase II will give us answers to three important questions; Who are we? (identity), Who are our neighbors? (context), and What is God calling us to do? (purpose) which will successfully move us into Phase III (The Call Process).

Phase III is where a Call Committee is formed, tasked with the role of identifying the candidate who is best suited to accompany the congregation into God's future. The Call Committee builds on the work of the Transition Team and the Ministry Site Profile. They will meet to establish community, discuss the process, familiarize themselves with careful reading of Rostered Minister Profiles, and refine interviewing styles and strategies. Eventually one candidate will be submitted to the Council and then to the congregation for a formal vote.

The process we are embarking on is complex, but we are not the first, nor the last congregation to undertake this journey. Indeed, we have been here before and many of you have served on the groups needed during the transition. We may be a bit older, and time and events may have changed the outlook of what our future looks like after nearly a decade, but I am positive that if we prayerfully listen to what the Holy Spirit is saying to us, we will be a stronger congregation when we complete our transition.

Love and Courage. A house divided against itself cannot stand. Jesus says this in today's Gospel from Mark 3, but, maybe you are like me in that this phrase rings in my memories in a speech given by Abraham Lincoln, in 1858, long before he was ever elected president. He was in a race for an Illinois Seat in the senate. A political battle between himself and Stephen Douglas, a very prominent politician, who had much more experience. The times were contentious. Anti Slavery and pro appeasement parties were the order of the day. Can't we all just get along? Was the undercurrent in most conversations. Conflict is messy. It sets neighbors against neighbors and family against family. Can we do all that we can, please, to just keep the peace? I can imagine you and I today and most people throughout history preferring that choice, the choice of compromise and middle ground. But Lincoln did not choose that. He spoke "A house divided against itself cannot stand. I believe this government cannot endure, permanently half slave and half free. I do not expect the Union to be dissolved—I do not expect the house to fall—but I do expect it will cease to be divided. It will become all one thing or all the other." I admit I'm a little surprised that talk like that established who he was, and what he stood for. He lost that election, you know, and yet, these statements resulted in making him, and his position known nationwide, resulting in his election to president of the united states two years later. I suppose a case could be made that Lincolns perspective is one reason we had a civil war, and thousands died. But I also suppose we could make the case that Lincoln's willingness to speak truth to power changed us as a people, and set us on the path to fight the racism and inequality that he saw, that still exists today.

But Lincoln is quoting Jesus. This gospel passage is from Mark, and is very early in the gospel account, he's just started gathering disciples, and doing a little healing, and casting out of spirits, and wham, he's confronted by a mob who think Jesus himself must be of the devil, if he's being this disruptor in the community. It's an unsettling text. And, the gospel reading is usually an opportunity to touch the gospel – the good news of God's saving love, in and through the person of his son Jesus. But there is good news here. The good news, I believe, is that Jesus is willing to get in the middle of arguments, of struggles, of the messiness of life. He doesn't make nice with his family here, and he doesn't respect the local authorities. Both of those are things that are often good things – we've even taught them in Sunday school. But It is good news because Jesus is showing us how to navigate confusing hard times. Get in the game. Be part of the conversation. Be willing to stand up for what you believe is right, even when pressure is applied to you to just get along. I think it's important, too that this gospel is paired with the Genesis reading where Adam and Eve screw up big time – unwilling to take responsibility for their own actions, they blame and point fingers instead of standing with integrity.

What do you suppose we are called to learn from these readings today, with a country that is polarized into political camps? In a world where poor countries still do not have access to the Covid 19 vaccine and people are perishing? In a society where the systemic racism of hundreds of years is being confronted? The Lutheran church observes a church year in which, following the festival days of Christmas and easter, we come to Pentecost, the birth of the church – the holy spirit filling the hearts of the faithful and sending them out to be the church today and always. We are calling this season at Holy Cross, "Hope is our Mission". How can we, as people of God in this place and time, offer Hope as we move forward in mission? The world is hurting right now my friends. The global pandemic has jolted us awake, while decimating families. The houseless population in the Salem area is growing, and in need. What will we do for them? What will we say about these issues in our neighborhoods, and in our society? How are we called to act as Christ acts in today's gospel? Perhaps the time is past when we just try to get along. Perhaps the time is here where we plant our flag, and state our claim to be inheritors of God's kingdom. I ask you, friends and family of Holy Cross – pray without ceasing that God will show you how to be God's emissaries in our community in the days ahead. To Show Love, and Courage.
