Marked as Christ's Own - Every day in our lives of serving God, many factors come into play. Sometimes, we have immense joy and promise, as on a day when we baptize a new life, stand before God and our peers to promise to raise that child with God's Word and Promise in one hand, and a boatload of human frailty in the other hand. Our eyes mist just a bit as we aspire to the vision of the words of Holy Baptism, and promise to do our best. It's all God asks of us, you know, to do our best. All the while, God knows we will fall short. We will disappoint ourselves, and our friends and family in this life. And yet we will each have a brush or two with greatness, courtesy of a loving Lord. The readings for today are blunt, and real. It's days like this where I marvel at the Revised Common Lectionary, that listing of the cycle of readings put together by a committee (I know, right?) that sometimes challenges me, but always teaches me something. The readings for today are about King David, and also about King Herod. Two sides of the coin of leadership. Two flawed individuals, and two moments in their lives. We catch King David at a high point - the ark of the covenant is coming into Jerusalem, and David is so happy, and so jubilant that he just has to dance! Gotta love that. Even though his wife Michal is embarrassed, it doesn't slow him down. In fact, he finishes his dance by feeding all comers - with bread, meat and raisins! How can you go wrong with raisins? It makes you forget for a minute, David's philandering and treachery with Bathsheba. And Herod, who's also having a party, uses his authority to manipulate his stepdaughter, and the judicial system all at once, in order to finally have John the Baptist put to death for calling Herod out for his sinful and unlawful behavior with his own brother's wife. Yeah, Herod's behavior here is disgusting from all sides. But his behavior simply cannot stop the forward march of Jesus' ministry, nor of His love for the world. So what do these flawed people teach us? Friends, I think they teach us that the love of God is enough. You and I are not enough, even if we were kings or rulers like David, and Herod, to change the world. And yet, we are enough for God's purpose. And through that purpose, the world is certainly changed. How does that work? Since today we shared the joy of baptism, I'm gonna have to start there. Here's our baptism scene - a font, filled with water, a shell, where water is dripped 3 times over the child. Folks gathered around to share the moment. There is a cloth to receive a few stray drops of water. There is oil, and anointing. A candle is lit. But who is the actor, or the 'doer' in the baptism? It is not the child, not the sponsor, not the parents, nor is it the pastor. The actor, the instigator of the action in baptism is God. God, God's power, and God's love are front and center today, as I see it today in our reading from 2 Samuel featuring King David and his dance. It's a big day for the people of God the ark of the covenant, that symbol of God's power which resides with the people he has chosen, is moved and brought into Jerusalem, the city that will one day house the temple. There's lots of side stories in these scriptures, but for a moment let's just look at that event. God's presence, the ark, which has been with the people since about a year after the exodus, fashioned lovingly at the base of Mount Sinai is moved. And, just being in the presence of that symbol of the God he loves, causes David to dance, and rejoice, and then, have a banquet. I can't help but notice that we aren't in the sanctuary today. We are worshipping outdoors for safety's sake, just as we worshipped in the gym for many months, in order to achieve distancing, just as we have created worship elements and posted them online for many months. But, each of those moments have one thing in common. We are still the church. God is still amongst us. God's blessings continue to be poured out, and we continue to find ways to serve God and God's people, together. Did you know that the father of our baptized child was received into membership here at Holy Cross at an outdoor service? Yep, the church is still the church, even as things change. At the core of that promise, is the life and ministry of Jesus, our lord. This week I had the joy of ordering the cake we will cut and serve after our worship today. It says, "Marked as Christ's Own". Of course its for Henry Owen, who is baptized and made new today. But of course it is for each of you as well. We are marked as Christ's own, and, as flawed and weak as each of us are, we are also called to proclaim Christ crucified and risen - God with us - and together we can change the world for God's glory.
