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Broken and Beloved Today's gospel is the familiar story of hungry men, women and children, being fed on a hillside at the sea of Galilee. They were people who were hungry for what Jesus had to offer them. They were people who were following Jesus as he and his disciples were ministering in Galilee - they were eager to hear what Jesus had to say, and to be witnesses to his healingsmaybe even be healed themselves. This is an important story from the bible, all 4 gospel writers recount this event. And it is an accessible story for you and I - we have all experienced hunger, and can put ourselves in the place of being fed as the crowd was fed. Today, though, as we read and ponder the gospel writer, John's account, I am drawn to the radical change of the status quo that Jesus models, which echoes through our celebration today at Holy Cross. Picture the hillside, with me, won't you, and the eager, yearning crowds gathered there, seeking healing. John's narrative takes the time to mention that Passover is near - and so, my thoughts drift to the celebration of Passover which would have taken place in Jerusalem, in the temple, organized so that men in good standing were invited to worship near the altar, and women and children allowed to be further away, and non Jews would be left to gather outside the colonnades, only eavesdropping on the holy rituals offered in that temple. I believe Jesus' heart was grieved for the barriers created by humanity between worship, and adoration of the Creator, and true caring for humanity. Here, on the hillside of plenty, all find a comfortable place on the grass, and food is passed to share - no questions asked - enough to feed them all - indeed the plenty is so great that 12 baskets full are gathered up of the broken pieces left over from the barley loaves. Jesus' vision of the church is here - on that grassy hillside in Galilee, just as I believe that vision is here in the garden courtyard of Holy cross on the corner of Sunnyview and Lansing. We have taken the steps and had the conversations necessary to put up signs that make our inclusion of all people, without artificial barriers related to their gender, their sexual orientation, or race an expectation. All are truly welcome, just as on the hillside that day. I wonder, now, how do we as followers of Christ, continue to model the openhanded inclusion of Jesus from John 6? Remember, the crowds were invited to rest, and be fed, not just gather for teaching or worship. This narrative is a model of the beloved community - where care and regard are manifested by the church Jesus founded to ensure an equitable life for everyone. I am so encouraged by your leadership here at Holy Cross since the last time we met, the documents have been signed to sell our property just across the parking lot to Family Promise, with whom we have partnered for many years, in order to facilitate the creation of expanded housing for families on the edge in our community. How else shall we as people of God address the needs of our community? Our city cleared out and cleaned out several homeless camps within a mile of our church this week. What shall we do as Jesus followers to serve in the gap? The needs of those displaced people continues. What is our role in offering practical support? John chapter 6 shows Jesus first noticing, and then responding to the needs of those gathered in a practical and generous way. How are we called to be practical and generous to the obvious needs that surround us here, in our own neighborhood? There is much to challenge us in this gospel, today, friends, but there is just as much to comfort us, especially in these days when the trauma of pandemic has affected us all. "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost.' Jesus says. There are so many moments in these times, when you and I are aware of our brokenness. Brokenness over the illness of so many, the death of people close to us, and of so many we never met. Brokenness over the disruption of our lives, the lost opportunities of being together, the relationships which did not survive the pandemic. But the image of brokenness for me as your pastor will always connect to the action of breaking the bread for holy communion, following Jesus' own example. I truly miss not being able to place a torn piece of bread in your open hands at the chancel rail. Please know that I am picturing placing that gift in each hand during all the communion moments we have shared together. I give you each, today and always, to hold in each heart, the image of the brokenness of Christ, given to the world, and to each of you, individually, to nurture you, and to create the beloved community of Christ in all the world. Amen.
