This **Sunday, October 3, 2021, at 10:00 AM,** we are again welcoming a guest pastor to Holy Cross. This time it will be Pastor Steve Carlson who will lead us in a Service of the Word and Sacrament. The choir will be on hand to sing the liturgy and provide some special music. As is our practice the congregation will be required to wear masks and sit socially distant from one another. Please join us for Holy Communion if you feel comfortable in doing so. You are welcome to bring your own communion elements if you prefer those to the gluten free bread/grape juice provided. Please monitor your health and stay home if you are feeling unwell.

The past three Sundays have given us examples of the types of worship services we will have going forward. On September 12 we celebrated God's Work, Our Hands Sunday with a Service of the Word led by a Lay Member and a message from one of our community partners. The next week, September 19, we held a full service of the Word and Sacrament with a pianist and choir singing the liturgy and a guest pastor preaching a sermon and leading us in Holy Communion. Last week, September 26, your church council led a Service of the Word, speaking the liturgy, no singing and a homily presented by a council member.

While similar, each of these three worship services provided contrasts in style and presentation. Much like our current transition time allows for discernment in where our mission is and who are next pastor should be, we are using this time to review our worship and determine what elements are necessary for future services. Please reflect over what you have seen and heard over the past few weeks and provide feedback to your council members.

For those of you who missed last week's service, I have included Lorraine's remarks below for your reading pleasure. I hope you find inspiration in the

cited passage and in her words. Perhaps the Holy Spirit is guiding you to volunteer your thoughts and feelings during a future Sunday service.

In closing, note that your council will be meeting with the Bishop's office this coming Wednesday, October 6th, to discuss getting an Interim Pastor assigned to Holy Cross. Homily presented on September 26, 2021 by Lorraine Odell

First, so you can stop wondering and focus on what I am saying...

All summer my ankle has been aching and I found that I had a lengthwise tear in my tendon. So I had it sewn up. If you want more details later, bring me some tea and I will fill you in. In the meantime, I am forced to slow down, so you can see why this verse has been coming to mind.

So, to start...

Be still and know that I am Lord, Psalm 46:10

When this first popped into my head, it resonated with my life. But I wanted to make sure I was thinking about it in the context. And I think I am close enough. My internet search, says that this verse related to stopping a war. To stop fighting and trust in God. Some translations say "cease striving."

One writer says "When we are still and surrendered to God, we find peace even when the earth gives way, the mountains fall (verse 2), or the nations go into an uproar and kingdoms fall (verse 6). When life gets overwhelming and busyness takes precedence, remember Psalm 46:10."

When I think of this Psalm, I see it at three different levels. We have the global level, the pandemic has shown us all that. We have the local level. In our communities and our relationships. And we have us as individuals. This speaks to me at all these levels.

In the first few months of the pandemic, we slowed down and tried to stop the virus from ravaging so many communities. Our industry, our travel, and our businesses slowed down. There were many effects from this – some not so good. But so many marveled at how their lives changed. They had dinner with their families instead of working late or going to softball practice. They found new ways to connect with families far away. Grandparents became masters at

Skyping so they could see their kids and grandkids. We learned to appreciate the people that we were used to seeing almost daily, but now could not. And we had a lot more time to get to know ourselves. But as time as passed, we have become impatient. Sure, slowing down was nice, but now it's time to get our lives back. We have things to do, places to go, and people to see. So much for society slowing down.

Be still and know that I am God. I don't know that this message was a lasting one – at least globally.

Then there is the local level. By this, I mean how we interact with our community. It is true that everything that happens in a community is because we have good people who step up and take action. Our food banks would not exist without people who organize it, get donations, and help distribute food. We have community volunteers to work with the homeless. Those who help fundraise for various causes. Some provide programs for underprivileged children. And the list goes on. Every good community has an army of people volunteering their time to make their world a better place to live for everyone.

Our church would not exist without people to take care of it. We make sure we have staff for the office, have a pastor, and open the doors every Sunday. We could hire to have some or all of it done – which we do, but we still need volunteers to oversee the whole thing.

Because of who we are and how we live out our faith, we consider service to the community to be a part of our church life. We are called to take care of the sick and the poor. That is an expression of our faith and for many, our faith would not be complete without service.

But we must make certain that staying busy with service does not stand in for our relationship with God. Making sandwiches for a food bank, gathering school supplies, and fixing up a house for a homeless person are all good and worthwhile activities. They are great expressions of our faith. But... we must not substitute that for spending time with God. Jesus recognized that being busy can interfere with our relationship with him. While he was visiting Mary and Martha one time, Martha was being a good hostess. She was very busy making sure that there was enough to eat, while Mary just sat there visiting with Jesus. Martha was a bit put out because she was doing all the work, but Jesus did not chide Mary. He told Martha that what Mary had chosen was better. He did not say that Martha was wrong to serve, only that just being with Jesus was important and to not overlook that. In fact, Martha and Mary both serve Jesus and the disciples on other occasions without reproof. My takaway is that both service and relationships are needed.

Its like our family. Every parent wants to make more money to send their kids to a good college, or take the time to lead a scout troop so everyone has a good experience, or even to volunteer in the community. But what our kids often need is just time with us. They want our attention one-on-one. They want us to see them as individuals. Or looking at it from the other end of life. Our seniors may appreciate us planning and making activities for them. But often they want us to come spend time with them. To stop moving and just be there. They too want us to know who they are, not just as an old person. I think God wants the same. He wants to spend time with us. To have our undivided attention. To be still and know that He is God.

And so, on an individual level, I try to bring balance into my spiritual life. Really, there are days that I want to just come to church and just spend time with God. I don't want to write checks, make more reports, adjust the heat, or any of the really necessary tasks. I just want to sit quietly with God. On the other hand, it makes me feel really good and useful. Like I am doing something worthwhile. I feel needed. I need both service and quiet time with God.

So, today I want to remind you that when life is overwhelming in its chaos and busy-ness to step back, stop what you are doing, and acknowledge who God is and what he can do.

Remember to be still and take comfort in knowing that He is God.
